In connection with the recent sad fatality at Upper Hutt, one of the outstanding features was the splendid efforts (for a time single-handed) of Commissioner (Dr) Kemp to succour the dying and the sorely wounded victims. Well may Upper Hutt be proud of its local doctor like Constable Mahoney, Dr Kemp never allows the one hand to know what the other is doing and parcels of good things have a habit of following him on his rounds amongst the poor

Hutt Valley Independent newspaper 09 October 1915

Presentation - Dr and Mr F W Kemp - A big party of members of the members of the Upper Hutt Bowling and Tennis Clubs paid a surprise visit to Dr Kemp on Thursday night to express their appreciation of his services in the encouragement of both bowling and tennis, and to wish him God Speed and safe return, on the eve of his going into camp on active service. After a few musical and other items had been gone through and the good things provided by the visitors done ample justice to, Mr Job Harrison (one of the two original promoter of the local bowling club movement) on behalf of the bowlers of Upper Hutt, in a short and happily worded speech asked the doctor to accept a set of hypodermic instruments, and safety shaving outfit, and a watch pendant of NZ gold and greenstone, as slight tokens of their good will and appreciation of his services in the district. It gave them a feeling of pride to know that their President was going on active service, especially so when compared with the hanging back of active unmarried men. They were sure Dr Kemp would prove the right man in the right place, no matter how or where he was located. The people of the district joined with him in wishing the doctor and Mrs Kemp success in their work and safe return to Upper Hutt. Dr Kemp, who was greeted with applause, said he was deeply indebted to the people of the district for many kindnesses he had received during the 5½ years he had dwelt among them and it required no token from them to keep them in his memory it was impossible for him to forget what had been one of the pleasantest periods in his life. He had felt it his duty to serve the Empire for some time past, but he had also a duty to the district, namely, to provide a substitute in whom both himself and the people could have every confidence. Having just recently, been fortunate in providing a suitable medical man to take his local work while absent, he had placed his own services at the disposal of the Defence authorities and had been accepted for active service. The war was likely to continue for some time and every man was needed to absolutely crush the military menace to civilisation. To stop short of that end meant giving the world's enemy an opportunity to make more elaborate preparations for a future attack on the Empire. He was pained to notice numbers of active young men shirking their duty and hanging back while their very liberty was threatened by the enemy who if successful would enforce military service from them. He was going into camp in a day or two, and he was proud of the fact that he was going on active service as a representative of Upper Hutt. On behalf of the Tennis Club and other ladies, Mr Harold R Gibbs asked Mrs Kemp to accept the gift of a greenstone tiki, a set of silver spoons with greenstone handles, and a set of brooches, as remembrances and tokens of esteem, on her leaving for active service in the British Military Hospitals. Dr Kemp, speaking on behalf of his wife, said she joined him in thanking them for the kind things that had been said that night. She, also, was resuming her profession of nurse, in order to go on active service (applause). She was leaving for England at an early date, and hoped to be appointed to a hospital where she would be able to nurse New Zealand soldiers (applause). At the conclusion of the war Mrs Kemp and himself would return to Upper Hutt and resume the many pleasant associations of the past 5½ years. He was extremely gratified to have such evidence of goodwill towards Mrs Kemp and himself as had been voluntarily shown them that night he would ask them to add to their good wishes their prayers. He was a firm believer in the efficacy of prayer. He concluded by quoting from Tennyson - "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of." After Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem had been sung by those present, Mrs Huggins called for three cheers for Miss Printzen who, had initiated the surprise party, and the gathering dispersed. God Protect and Prosper Dr and Mrs Kemp in their work, and bring them back safely - Amen

Mrs Julia Caroline KEMP during World War One became a nurse with the New Zealand Voluntary Aid Detachment and New Zealand Red Cross Society born 02 June 1881 Huggate Yorkshire England. Extracted from the London Gazette 08th April 1919 the citation reads His Majesty the KING has been graciously please to approve of the award of the Royal Red Cross (2nd Class) to the undermentioned Lady [*Madame Julia Kemp Voluntary Aid Detachment*] in recognition of her valuable nursing service in connection with the war.
