

Upper Hutt Heritage Sites List

The Upper Hutt History Group meets at the Upper Hutt Library on the 2nd Wednesday of each month. They all agreed that a list of Upper Hutt Heritage sites and buildings should be created.

A member of the group Nickolas (Nick) Beynon (New Zealand Archaeological Association) met with the Mayor of Upper Hutt Wayne Guppy in 2017. Nick began discussion requesting the establishment of a register listing all pre 1900 buildings and historical sites in the Upper Hutt district. An email was sent to members of the Upper Hutt Historical group.

Another member of the group Christopher (Chris) Benson typed up a draft list and handed copies to other members of the History Group at the March 2018 meeting.

Nick and Lynly requested a copy of the Ecology and Heritage Verification Study report from the Boffa Miskell Limited and presented to the Upper Hutt City Council in December 1995. From the inventory list, 51 ecological and heritage features were identified for inclusion on the schedule of protected areas. The remaining 121 items required further research.

I began compiling a list with additional details from research that I had undertaken over the years. Adding to this list was the information from Chris and the Boffa Miskell report. I checked the New Zealand Historical Places Trust website and located a list relating to the Upper Hutt district. I also checked the Upper Hutt City Council website Chapter 26 Rules for Heritage Features document on line and the details were added to the list.

This document is a work in progress and will be updated from time to time when additional records are available.
