<u>Peace Celebrations</u>	
At a Meeting of the Local Peace Celebration Committee I was Directed to ask you to be good enough to use your influence and secure the services of the Trentham Band for the celebrations on Sunday and Tuesday. An application has been made to the Camp Commandant, and in answer we were informed that the band may be available for us, but it all depended upon the instructions issued for Head Quarters. The success of any function of this kind depends a good deal upon having a band, and we thought that as Wellington is well supplied with bands, but would probable also require the band on Monday we may be able to have it for the other days. The outlying districts of Mangaroa, Wallaceville, Kaitoke, Whiteman's Valley, Akatarawa and Te Marua are combining with Upper Hutt and having united celebration at Maidstone Park and they join with us in hoping that we may have the services of the band.

### Evening Post 26 Apr 1922

At Upper Hutt - The green fields and trees of Maidstone Park made an appropriate scene for the Upper Hutt Memorial Service, which was organised by the Upper Hutt Town Board, on lines suggested by the Town Clerk, Mr Lodge. On the platform were the chairman of the board, Mr W Greig, the Revs Barnett and McCaul and Sir Thomas Mackenzie, whose address is reported elsewhere. The Upper Hutt Band, newly formed, played with a merit, indicating steady practice. The service was in every way a distinct success.

### Evening Post 27 Apr 1922

Historically, the Anzac memorial service at Upper Hutt on Tuesday was placed on a high plane by the presence of a former Prime Minister and High Commissioner of New Zealand, Sir Thomas Mackenzie, who was also a member of the British Royal Commission during the war, and as a member of the Dardanelles Commission, Sir Thomas Mackenzie is in a position to speak with authority; and he spoke with enough candour to throw some new light on the inception of the Expedition, and to give certain half-secrets a wider currency.

### Evening Post 17 Apr 1925

Memorial Gate at Trentham - To-morrow Bishop Sprott will officiate at the dedication of the memorial lych-gate at Trentham, erected by the members of the St John's Anglican Church in memory of those belonging to the Church who fell in the Great War. The gate, which is in keeping with the Church and its surroundings, is of oiled jarrah, the roof being of asbestos tiles. The stones for the wall were taken from the Hutt river-bed, being generously given by the owner of the property from which they were taken, and gathered and carted without cost by vestrymen

and other men of the parish. There is also a tablet bearing the names of the fallen inside the north wall of the gateway and this is of grey Australian granite. The wall extends from each side of the gateway, but is not properly part of the memorial, being added as a setting to the lych-gate and as a part of a scheme for the whole frontage of the churchyard on the Main road.

#### Evening Post 20 Apr 1925

Disillusioned - unrealised blessings - Bishop Sprott on War's Results - St John's Church, Trentham, was filled on Saturday afternoon on the occasion of the dedication by Bishop Sprott of the lych-gate which has been built as a memorial to the men belonging to the church, who fell in the Great War. A short service on the lines of the usual evening prayer was held in the church, the lessons being read by the Rev N S Barrett and the Rev J H Sykes (both former vicars of the parish), the present vicar, the Rev G V Kendrick, taking the rest of the service, and Bishop Sprott addressing the congregation. The Bishop said that he thought people in general were not favouring the erection of memorials as much as they had done immediately after the war. It was not that we were forgetting, it was not due to the passage of time, but largely that we had been disillusioned and lost something of that feeling of elation prevalent during the war. We had anticipated wonderful blessing to follow on the Armistice. Perhaps we had expected too much. Had we any right to expect more than a recovery to pre-war status? But whatever the results of the war, whatever our disillusionments, they should not lessen our admiration for those young men, who full of life and vitality, full of plans and ambitions for the future, had laid down their lives for us. His Lordship said he thought it was particularly appropriate for the dedication to take place at Easter time - the festival of immortality. To those who had lived their full life, death was not unwelcome, but our soldiers were young, and could not be expected to look at it in that light. He liked to think of the beautiful lines in the Book of Revelations "His servants shall serve Him, and they shall see His face" and to think of our brave men as passing to higher service. "Lych," said the speaker, was an Anglo-Saxon word, meaning "corpse," and a lych-gate was a gate leading into a churchyard, under which the coffin or bier could rest. But we could dissociate our thoughts from that grim idea, for in the words of the hymn just sung: Jesus lives henceforth is death. But the gate of life immortal. At the close of the address the clergy, followed by the congregation, moved to the gate, where prayers were offered by Bishop Sprott, including a particularly beautiful one for our Empire and those who had died to save it. The gate, which is similar in design to that of St Mary's, New Plymouth, is of oiled jarrah, with roof of asbestos tiles, and the memorial tablet is of grey Australian granite, bearing the inscription: - This gate is erected to the Glory of God and in memory of those members of the Church of England, who, from Trentham, Upper Hutt, and surrounding districts, laid down their lives in the Great War. August 1914 - November 1918. Archdeacons Johnson and Hansell, and the Revs Barnett, Sykes, Fry, Compton, Isaacson, and Groves attended, and they, and a large number of those present at the ceremony, were afterwards entertained at tea in the vicarage grounds.

At Upper Hutt - The memorial services in Upper Hutt district were well attended. In the morning, St John's Church, Trentham, was crowded. The Presbyterian minister, the Rev. J Holmes, read the lesson, and the Rev. G V Kendrick addressed the congregation, after which a verse of the National Anthem was sung, and a wreath was laid on the memorial tablet at the lych-gate, and the Last Post was sounded. Wreaths were also placed on the graves of all soldiers buried in the churchyard. In the afternoon the Upper Hutt Town Board arranged for a further observance at Maidstone Park, where a large number of residents assembled. A verse of the National Anthem, introductory remarks by Mr A J McCurdy (chairman of the board), prayer, hymns, and scripture reading by the Rev. G V Kendrick, preceded an address by the Rev. F B Lawrence (Karori and Marlborough), who had seen active service with, the Forces. The Rev. J Holmes also addressed the gathering, and pronounced the Benediction, after which the Upper Hutt Band played The Garland of Flowers, and Bandsman Neighbours sounded the Last Post.

At St. Joseph's Catholic Church a special Mass for the Dead was celebrated at 8 am by the Rev. Father Kelly, followed by a Benediction service. The church was packed, and upwards of two hundred partook of Holy Communion. The choir sang a number of appropriate hymns in English, including Nearer My God to Thee, and the celebrant delivered an address suitable to the occasion. At the conclusion of the Benediction service the congregation stood while the Dead

March in Saul was played by the organist. In the afternoon the children of St. Joseph's Orphanage assembled, and proceeded in procession to the Catholic churchyard, where they decorated the grave of Seaman Doran of HMS Chatham.

The Upper Hutt Borough Council decided last night that Anzac Day should be observed as it was last year, with a gathering in the school grounds at 3.15 p.m. on 25th April, so as not to clash with the church services. The Returned Soldiers' Association, said the Mayor, was endeavouring to arrange for the Rev. F. B. Lawrence to give the address again and the Anglican and Presbyterian ministers would co-operate. As chairman of the School Committee, Councillor W. Greig gave immediate permission, for the use of the school grounds.

At Upper Hutt - Services of the Upper Hutt district were held by the Rev. Father Kelly in the Roman Catholic Church at 7.30 am and by the Rev. Mr Holmes in the Presbyterian Church and the Rev. G V Kendrick in the Anglican Church (St. John's, Trentham), at 11 am at the latter service a wreath was laid at the foot of the memorial lych gate. In the afternoon a public ceremonial, arranged by the Mayor, was held in the Upper Hutt State School grounds, the speaker being the Rev. F B Lawrence (Karori and Marlborough), himself a Digger. The clergy of the district also joined in this service, the Lord's Prayer and Scripture reading being given by the Rev. Mr Holmes, and an address and the Benediction by the Rev. G V Kendrick. Returned soldiers, borough councillors, members of the friendly societies, pupils of the schools, and many others gathered for the service, and the local band played the music for the hymns and the National Anthem.

Mr. Hunt, another of the speakers, said he was very pleased that the matter had been mentioned. He himself could speak personally of the valuable work being done by the heads of the R.S.A., and he was sure that many men had benefited from it. I know, of no other association that is doing better work than the Returned Soldiers Association, added the rev. gentleman, and I take off my hat to the RSA. Opportunity was also taken to again give public acknowledgment, on behalf of the Wellington Returned Soldiers Association, to the magnificent work of the Upper Hutt residents during the war period in attending to the wants of the thousands, of men who marched through the district, going to and from Trentham and Featherston, and extending to them many kindnesses.

Anzac Day - Anzac Day will be observed tomorrow (Saturday) in the Upper Hutt with the Church Services, in the morning and evening and a Citizens Service in the afternoon. Special church services at St John's Anglican Church and the Presbyterian Church will be held in the morning at 11 am and an evening service at the Salvation Army Hall at 7 pm. The citizens service in the afternoon will be held in the Maidstone Park, commencing at 3 pm (if the weather is unsuitable the service will be transferred to the Record Hall). The Municipal Band will be in attendance and it is hoped that a combined choir will lead the singing. Any members of choirs in the district will be welcomed, and special accommodation will be set aside for them. The usual parade of South African Veterans, Returned Soldiers and Scouts, headed by the band, will leave the Upper Hutt Court House at 2.30 pm sharp, and the executive of the local branch of the Returned Soldiers appeal to all returned men to be on parade that afternoon, medals and decorations to be worn. The address will be delivered by the Rev Mr Tooley of St Cuthbert's assisted by other ministers in the district.

Anzac Day in the Upper Hutt - Citizens Memorial Service - Owing to the wet weather the Citizens Service was held in the Record Hall (by permission of Mr A J McCurdy). The usual procession of returned men was, however, carried out. Falling in at the Court House, the procession moved off, led by the Upper Hutt Municipal Band, then followed the armed detail from the Trentham Camp, under Corporal Foubister, South African Veterans, Returned Soldiers, Legion of Frontiersmen and Boy Scouts. The marshal of the parade was Mr A Collins, assisted by the Secretary of the Returned Soldiers Association. Arriving at the hall, reserved places for the parade was soon occupied and in a very short time the hall was overflowing with citizens, and as stated later on by one of the speakers, one of the best crowds seen in Upper Hutt for Anzac Day.

Anzac Service At Upper Hutt - The citizens' Anzac Service will be held on Sunday afternoon in Maidstone Park at 3.15 p.m. If the weather is anyway wet, the Mayor has offered the use of the Record Hall. A parade of all returned men will be held, and ex-Servicemen are asked to fall in outside the Courthouse at 2.45 p.m. The service, has been postponed 15 minutes this year, so as to allow the residents from the Trentham and Silverstream areas the opportunity of catching the rail car from town, which arrives at Upper Hutt at 3.14 p.m.

The Mayor (Mr A J McCurdy) presided, and the address was given by the president of the local Branch of the RSA (Mr S F Carver, MM)

Over 800 people attended the Anzac Day ceremony at Maidstone Park, Upper Hutt. The parade, which was the biggest seen in the borough, comprised South African and Great War veterans, Red Cross units, the Home Guard, including two mounted troops, a Territorial platoon. Girl Guides, the St. John Ambulance. EPS units, the Upper Hutt Volunteer Fire Brigade and the Municipal Band. The Mayor, Mr J Blewman, presided at the service and the address was given by the Rev J L Holland, CF.

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
