1843	Oct. 21	Page 338	Police Office Nelson column "On Tuesday, two Germans named Subritzky and Diekman , were charged by another named Posti with having endeavoured to intimidate him from following his work. The prisoners appeared to be under the belief that the prices they received were less than those paid to English immigrants. On the prisoners engaging to pay the complainant for his loss of time and promising not to offend again they were dismissed. Several Germans who had been recently in the employ of Mr Beit were charged by that gentleman with having detained some of his tools. The prisoners pleaded that there was an unsettled account between them selves and Mr Beit, and that they had detained the tools until their accounts were settled. On the tools being returned charges was withdrawn. On Thursday and Friday, the time of the Court was occupied in hearing the charge of Mr Sclanders against Mr Dunn and Mr Beit , for having taken a couple of horses belonging to him. The horses had been imported into the colony by Dr Imlay, and Mr Sclanders, had obtained possession of them from his late agent, who is at present in Sydney, for an advance of money. Mr Dunn claimed the horses, we believe, on the ground that he had a power of attorney from Dr Imlay to take possession of what property he had in the colony. After a very patient investigation it was decided that Messrs. Dunn and Beit had no right to forcibly seize the horses, and on their payment of costs the case was dismissed.

1844	Sep.	Page 107	We are happy to announce the arrival of the ship Skiold, having on board fifty Germans with their families, and six cabin passengers. The expedition is under the charge of Mr Beniot and two other gentlemen, who bought seven sections of land in this settlement before their departure. The Company effected exchanges in England with them, in order to allow of their obtaining the land in one block; and they yesterday visited their section, which are situated close to Mr Cauley's and Mr Spooner's farms. With four out of the seven sections we believe they expressed themselves satisfied; and we hope some arrangement may be made for exchanging the remainder for better land. It is a gratifying circumstance connected with the expedition, that all the labourers will be employed by the cabin passengers; and in order to provide for the first year, the latter wisely put on board provisions sufficient for twelve month's consumption after arrival.

1846	Sep. 26		Police Office, Nelson Sept. 23 Christopher Lange , a young German, was charged by Dr Monro, in whose service he had lived as shepherd, with having stolen, in March last, a sack and other articles from the cottage of Mrs Avery, of Waimea West. The evidence was such as to leave no doubt of his guilt, and the case was summarily disposed of by sentencing him to 2 months imprisonment and hard labour.
